## Coach Hussion steps down from baseball

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Union County baseball is about to face a surprise change.

C.T. Hussion, the man who built the Panthers' program back to respectability over the past five seasons, is stepping down.

He'll still be teaching at Union County, but he won't be coaching for a while.

Hussion, 38, is stepping down to further his education. He's in pursuit of a six-year specialist's degree to prepare for a step up into administration.

"My wife and I are both planning on starting at Piedmont in the fall in the specialist program," Hussion said. "We're both getting teacher leadership specialist and I'm going to go on and get a three-class educational leadership add-on. It's kind of like getting a double-specialist."

Hussion said that his educational pursuits would take about two and a half years to complete.

"I'm going to spend some much-needed time with my family," he said. "We've got young kids and all they've

ever known is me being Coach Hussion. I'm looking forward to spending more time with them and watching them grow up."

Union County Athletic Director Jim Hughes said Hussion's decision came as "a big shock."

"And I totally understand what he's doing," Hughes said. "It's a career move. He's going after that six-year degree while his kids are still young."

"We hate to lose him as a coach, he did a great job," Hughes said. "Right now, we're in the process of filling that position. And hopefully, we'll be able to announce that soon."
