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Panthers remain tied atop 8-AA with two blowout wins

Union visits Banks County Tuesday in pivotal region showdown

Union County (15-7, 6-1) collected its 15th win and secured a top-three seed in the upcoming Region 8-AA tournament with a pair of one-sided home victories over East Jackson and Athens Academy.

Ahead of those two wins, the Panthers saw a five-game winning streak end on Monday, Jan. 23, courtesy of a non-region loss at North Hall.

The Region 8-AA playoff picture should come into focus this week as Union County visits third-place Banks County (14-7, 4-2) on Tuesday before traveling to fifth-place East Jackson on Friday. Still tied with Providence (19-3, 6-1) for 8-AA's top spot, the Panthers can lock up a top-two seed with a win on Tuesday.

The Leopards sit one game back of Union County and 7th-ranked Providence and can move into a second-place tie with a Tuesday win over the Panthers. Furthermore, with two losses in 8-AA, Banks County remains in the hunt for the No. 1 seed and could force a three-way tie atop the standings with home victories over Union County and Providence.

Panthers 78, Athens Academy 63 -- Union County ended one basket shy of scoring 80 points in three consecutive home games during a blowout win over fourth-place Athens Academy (13-8, 3-4).

Sophomore Hayden Hughes recorded a career-high 25 points on 6-of-14 shooting from 3-point range. With a half-dozen treys on Friday night, Hughes is 34 for 66 (52%) from downtown during January while averaging 15.5 points over the same span.

Senior Eli Underwood notched his third straight double-double and the 11th of the year, going for 10 points and 11 rebounds. Sophomore Jude Ellis scored 12 of his 15 points after halftime, logging seven boards, three assists and two steals.

Sophomore Houston Henry had 11 points, six rebounds and six assists; sophomore Maddox Young added 8 points and freshman Cade Dockrey scored seven.

Despite the end result, the Panthers trailed 15-9 near the two-minute mark of the first quarter before closing the frame with nine straight and an 18-15 edge.

Hughes' second triple started the run, then a 3-point play from Henry tied the game at 15-15. Dockrey put the finishing touches on the quarter with a trey at the buzzer, moving the Panthers on top for good.

Union County began the second with a 7-2 spurt, capping a 16-2 outburst that saw the home team seize control at 25-17. Dockrey opened the second with a dribble drive for two, followed by a Maddox Young 3-pointer and an Underwood post-up.

Two buckets by Young and an Ellis pull-up jumper kept the Panthers out front 31-23 as the Spartans' reigning 8-A Private Player of the Year, junior Kymel Williams, matched Union shot-for-shot.

Williams finished with a game-high 28 points on 12-for-22 shooting.

The Panthers eventually opened up a double-digit margin when Hughes' baseline reverse layup and Henry's dribble drive produced a 37-27 advantage with 90 seconds remaining in the first half. Athens Academy answered with a deuce but missed two free throws on its ensuing possession,

mark and scored down low 90 seconds later to provide a 35-19 halftime cushion.

The third frame was all Union County, storming out to a 42-19 advantage on consecutive Henry baskets and a Hughes triple. The Panthers outscored East Jackson 20-7 in the period behind seven from Henry and a pair of 3's from Hughes.

Marevka kicked off the fourth with a jump hook, then Dockrey and Young made it a 62-29 game less than a minute in. Dockrey rattled off five straight, Ellis scored in the paint, and sophomore Kaden Combs knocked down a trey before Dockrey scored again to build a 74-37 lead.

Over the final 4:05, Marevka split two free throws and scored inside on back-to-back trips; sophomore Braden Plott connected from downtown and converted a dribble drive, and freshman Gunnar Akins crashed the boards for two more.

Hughes ended with 9 points on 3 of 8 from downtown, contributing four rebounds and four assists. Young scored 9 points with three assists and three steals.

Plott and Marevka finished with 5 points apiece; Combs had 3 points and a steal; Ellis ended the night with 2 points, seven boards and three assists. Akins had 2 points and two rebounds; Cruise hauled in three boards and dished out one assist.

The Panthers also welcomed back sophomore guard Brayden Hogsed, who logged one assist in 4 minutes after missing over a month due to injury.

Underwood scored 8 points in the opening frame as the Panthers held a 19-8 advantage after one. Alongside buckets by Dockrey and Young, the senior leader continued to score at will early in the second when a trey from Young extended the Union lead to 28-13.

Underwood knocked down a 3-pointer at the two-minute

12 second-chance points; 16 turnovers; 9 points off turnovers. Athens -- 28 for 63 shooting (44%); 5 of 20 (25%) from 3-point range and 4 for 9 (44%) at the line; 27 rebounds (9 offensive); 40 points in the paint; 12 second-chance points; 6 turnovers; 21 points off turnovers.

Panthers 84, East Jackson 42 -- Wednesday night's 8-AA makeup game vs. the Eagles proved to be no contest as Union County raced ahead 8-0 and never looked back.

Dockrey turned in a breakout performance on the offensive end, scoring a career-high 17 points in 17 minutes on 7-of-10 shooting.

Henry, playing in front of the home crowd for the first time since his last-second heroics vs. Providence, supplied a 13-point, 11-assist performance to go with three steals and three rebounds.

Underwood continued doing his thing, scoring a game-high 19 points and hauling in 15 rebounds.

The Panthers established Underwood down low early in the game, setting the tone for his program's most lopsided win since he was in the third grade -- a 73-25 victory at Murphy, North Carolina on Jan. 8, 2014.

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25-25, but North Hall finished strong once again, building a seven-point margin at the break.

Behind 47-42 in the third, Union County yielded a 14-2 Trojan run and faced a daunting 61-44 deficit entering the fourth.

Underwood finished with 11 points, 12 rebounds and two assists; Henry had 9 points, four assists and two steals. The Union point guard finished with more turnovers (six) than assists for the first time since the Jan. 3 loss at Providence; the Panthers are 2-6 this season when Henry's turnovers surpass his assist total.

Young had six points and a game-high six assists; Dockrey had 2 points and a career-best eight boards. Marevka chipped in 2 points and Plott added a steal.

Game stats: Union -- 24 for 53 shooting (45%); 10 for 27 (37%) from deep and 7 of 8 (88%) at the line; 29 rebounds (12 offensive); 26 points in the paint; 14 second-chance points; 23 turnovers; 14 points off turnovers. NHHS -- 32 for 67 (48%); 9 for 23 from deep (39%) and 5 of 7 (71%) at the line; 31 rebounds (16 offensive); 46 points in the paint; 16 second-chance points; 16 turnovers; 23 points off turnovers.

Up next: Union County and Banks County's varsity action gets underway at 6 p.m. Tuesday in Homer. The Panthers can lock down a top-two seed in 8-AA with a win, while a loss drops Union into a tie for second with the Leopards. The Panthers defeated Banks County 72-58 on Jan. 10 in Blairsville.

Union's last win at Banks came during the 2010-11 season, but it's worth noting the two schools were in different classifications between 2013-2018.

On Friday, Union County travels to East Jackson (7-15, 1-6), where the Eagles are an entirely different animal, sporting a respectable 5-5 record in Nicholson. East Jackson is 2-10 away from home.

Union's final regular season game is at home next Tuesday, Feb. 7 vs. Fellowship Christian.

"I want to keep hitting our court turnout and how much we appreciate them," Garrett said. "We're getting down to the nitty gritty and I want to keep this energy rolling in case we host the region tournament or a State [playoff] game. I really want to give a big thank you to the home crowd, it's a big deal how much they help us. We know that home court advantage is real thing for us, so we want to thank them and encourage them to keep coming out."

Lady Panthers knock off Athens Academy; upset by East Jackson

Union County (12-10, 3-3) suffered a setback on Tuesday with an upset loss to East Jackson but rebounded with a Friday night victory over second-place Athens Academy.

The Lady Panthers dropped a non-region makeup game at North Hall on Monday night, but head coach Brad Cochran likes where his team is heading into the postseason.

"The East Jackson loss hurt our chances at the No. 2 seed, but as long as we finish third, we avoid [top-seeded] Banks County until the region championship, and that's the most important thing to me," he said. "We still have to beat East Jackson at their place, but I think we'll be better prepared for them the second time around."

The Lady Panthers visit third-ranked Banks County (17-3, 6-0) on Tuesday, looking to halt the Leopards' 13-game winning streak. Union County travels to East Jackson on Friday.

Lady Panthers 47, Athens Academy 44 - Things didn't go as planned when Union County visited Athens Academy on Jan. 6.

In the first game following junior Lara Turner's injury, and without the services of their head coach, the Lady Panthers struggled from the jump in a 41-27 loss. But the rematch proved much different as a full-strength Union County squad led most of the night, then fended off a late rally to take down the Spartans, 47-44 in Blairsville.

Sophomore Ariel McCarter led the way with 15 points, 6 rebounds and two steals. Corinne Hill had 10 points, seven boards and three assists.

Hill, McCarter and Turner led the early charge, pacing the Lady Panthers to early leads of 6-0, 8-2 and 10-4. The trio combined for 14 of the team's 17 first-quarter points. A 3 by junior Kamryn Mull opened up a 13-5 advantage and Union County, led 17-13 after one.

Junior Morgan Warren opened the second quarter scoring, but points were at a premium the rest of the half as Athens Academy took a 22-21 advantage into the break.

Like the first half, Union County exploded out of the gates after halftime, scoring 14 straight points to mount a 35-22

lead just past the midway point of the game.

"At halftime, I begged the girls to be more patient and let the offense flow for us," Cochran said. "[Athens Academy] tweaked its defense a little bit, but all we had to do is be more patient and work the ball around. And once we did, we were able to open up a good lead."

Mull, Turner and sophomore Katelyn Brown poured in the first 12 points before Hill capped the run with a mid-range jumper. The Spartans answered with consecutive buckets until a Turner jumper and a Warren layup kept the margin at a comfortable 39-28.

Over the period's final 49 seconds, Athens Academy scored four-in-a-row to move within striking distance at 39-32.

Both offenses struggled early in the fourth, but Hill scored off a turnover near the 4:40 mark. The Spartans responded with a 3-pointer moments later, then went 1-for-2 at the line and converted a steal into 2 points, slicing the margin to 41-38 with 2:45 remaining.

Union answered with a putback from Hill and a breakaway layup by McCarter. The Spartans split two free throws and McCarter made 2 of 2, extending the margin to 47-39 with 1:24 to play.

Those two free throws proved vital as the Lady Panthers wouldn't score again.

Athens Academy scored in the paint at the 1:10 mark, and again with 44 seconds left. A Union County turnover resulted in a 1-for-2 visit to the charity stripe for the Spartans with 21 seconds remaining.

Up 47-44 with 12 seconds left, the Lady Panthers missed the front end of a 1-and-1, allowing Athens Academy one final look at a game-tying 3-pointer. Despite getting off an open look from the corner, the Spartans' jumper bounced off the iron as time expired.

Turner stuffed the stat sheet with 8 points, 10 rebounds, four assists, three steals and three blocks. Mull had 6 points on 2 of 4 from long distance, chipping in three rebounds and three assists in the win. Brown finished with 4 points and five boards; Warren added 4 points and a rebound.

UCHS recognized seniors Hill and Ivie Chapman after the game.

"I don't have enough words for our two seniors," Cochran said. "Both of them are great and both are dedicated to this program 100%. They are Panthers for life."

"Ivie is the mom and I love her for it. She is a great leader and she wants to win. It doesn't matter if she's playing or not playing, she wants this team to win."

"Hill, she leaves everything on that floor - practice and games. She's not very vocal, but

she leads by example, and that's hard to find."

Lady Panthers 48, East Jackson 51 - Union County missed 8 of its final 10 free throws and the Eagles hit their last 10 at the line to overcome a 26-20 halftime deficit.

"We missed free throws, we had bad possessions and we didn't protect the basketball," Cochran said. "We allowed one girl to beat us and we just didn't take pride in our defense."

The Lady Panthers held a 29-22 advantage early in the third but East Jackson rallied to a 33-32 lead at the period's 1-minute mark. Union County missed four straight free throws to finish the frame and the Eagles took a 35-32 edge into the fourth.

A short jumper from Hill, followed by a putback and a trey by McCarter, awarded Union a 39-35 lead with 5:20 remaining. Warren crashed the boards on the ensuing possession and the Lady Panthers owned a 41-37 advantage approaching the quarter's midway point.

All tied up at 41-41, McCarter knocked down a jumper at the 3-minute mark, but East Jackson immediately attacked for a quick layup and a 43-43 score.

McCarter split two free throws, but an Eagles fast break put the visitors back on top 45-44. Union's final lead of the night came on Hill's jumper in the paint with 1:44 to play, but East Jackson went back in front 20 seconds later via a dribble drive for two.

The Eagles knocked down two free throws with 38 seconds left and Mull answered with a drive 13 seconds later, keeping



the Lady Panthers within a point at 49-48.

Union County forced a quick turnover but failed to convert it into points and East Jackson hit two more free throws with 9 seconds remaining. Down 51-48, the Lady Panthers got off two looks from 3-point range but couldn't force overtime.

McCarter finished with 25 points; Hill had 12, Turner scored 7 points and Warren added 2 points.

No team stats were available for the East Jackson game.

Lady Panthers 49, North Hall 55 - Union County entered the break tied 25-25 and scored the first 5 points of the third quarter, but couldn't hang on down the stretch in a non-region makeup contest on Monday, Jan. 23.

Trailing 42-38 after three, the Lady Panthers fought back to within a basket at 42-40 and 44-42, but the Trojans put the game out of reach with an 11-4 run.

McCarter went for 19 points, seven assists, five rebounds and four steals. Turner had 12 points and seven boards.

North Hall scored the game's first 5 points, but Union County outscored the home team 15-9 to grab a brief 15-14 edge during the second frame. With the Lady Panthers trailing 25-23 with 13 seconds left in the first half, McCarter found Warren on an inbounds pass to even the score at the intermission.

Following a Trojans' miss to start the third, Hill hit McCarter for a 15-footer and a 27-25 lead. On Union's next trip, Turner's penetration led to a McCarter triple from the right

wing. North Hall moved within a point at 30-29 via two visits to the free throw line, then took the lead for good with a basket in the paint with 5:23 left in the quarter.

The Trojans kept their foot on the gas, drilling 3s on the next two possessions, stretching the lead to 37-30 just 63 seconds later.

McCarter started the fourth with a runner in the lane. Later, with her team down 46-40, Turner sank a pull-up jumper with 5:49 to play.

McCarter hit two free throws at the 5:15 mark to move within two at 46-44, but the Lady Panthers wouldn't get any closer as North Hall rattled off five straight.

Warren ended the night with 8 points and four rebounds. Hill had 6 points, five rebounds, three steals and two assists. Mull added 4 points and three boards; Brown pulled down seven rebounds to go with three steals and two assists.

Lyons - In the final tune-up ahead of this weekend's Area Tournament at Union County High School, the Panthers collected 116 points to finish seventh out of 16 teams at Toombs County's Sweet Onion Invitational on Saturday.

During last weekend's trip to south Georgia, Union County collected six top-five finishes, headlined by sophomore Payton Legatt's first-place performance at 157 lbs. Junior Anderson Clouse took home silver at 132 and junior David Heredia was third at 165.

Freshman Thomas Gary (120), junior Zander Rotko (138) and sophomore Asa Smith-Foot (150) each came in fifth place in their respective weight class.

Legatt opened his title run with a pinfall victory over Charlton County's Thomas Johnson, followed by an 11-2 major decision vs. Rylan Sawyer of West Laurens.

He pinned Vidalia's Jack Godbee in the semifinals before edging East Laurens' Roman Coley via a 10-9 decision in the finals.

Clouse dropped a major decision to Lowndes County senior Tyson McCollough in the finals. He picked up a major decision over Pierce County's Braden Thome in the semis after pinning East Laurens' Tex Edge in the quarters. The junior's weekend began with a 22-second pin of West Laurens' Zane Seymour.

Heredia received a first-

round bye before needing just 44 seconds to pin Lowndes County's Brian Goosden. Heredia fell in the semis to the eventual champion, West Laurens senior Drake Wood via a 6-4 decision.

In the consolation bracket, Heredia pinned Pierce County's David Lyons, then took home bronze by pinning Coffee County's Lawson Moseley.

Gary opened with a 120-lb pinfall victory over Charlton County's Jonathan Strag, then collected a 16-11 decision over Pierce County's Shawn Szabo. Gary suffered a semifinal pinfall defeat to Bryan Cates of Coffee County, then fell to Toombs County's Samuel Register in the consols.

Gary took home fifth with a forfeit victory over Dayvion Huttoo of Dodge County.

Rotko was fifth at 138, finishing his tournament by pinning Coffee County's Gunner Merritt in 24 seconds. Rotko opened the weekend with pinfall victories over Cody Brown and Ethan Story, but fell in the semis

to Peach County's Zachary Davis. Rotko dropped his first consolation match to Lowndes County's Ian Stephens.

Union's final top-five finisher, Smith-Foot, pinned Screven County's Carson Ellis in his consolation bracket finale. He started the event by pinning Matthew Siegler of Burke County and Sam Kelly of Toombs County.

East Laurens' Cole Page pinned Smith-Foot in the semifinals, followed by another pin at the hands of Charlton County's Michael Johnson.

Every Union County wrestler advanced at least one round with sophomore Logan Duckworth (106), freshman Riley Moettenson (113), senior Colson Lotts (144), senior Huck Whisenhunt (175) and freshman Jackson Arthur (285) all finishing the tournament with a 1-2 record.

UCHS hosts the Traditional Area Tournament beginning 10 a.m. Saturday at the high school gym. The teams attending are Banks County, East Jackson, Fannin County and Union.

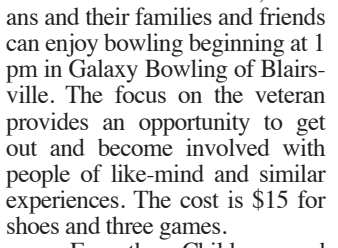
