Annual landscape seminar rooted in gardening education

Plant enthusiasts took root inside the Haralson Memorial Civic Center on Wednesday, April 12, for a six-hour landscape seminar on native plants.

The Blairsville Garden Club presented the 32nd Annual Landscape Seminar in cooperation with the Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center, the Union County Extension Service and the Georgia Department of Transportation Wildflower Program.

As is always the case, and now for the 32nd year, the purpose of the event was to invite expert guest speakers to educate those who wished to grow their horticultural knowledge base.

And while the club is small, containing only 13 members currently, its reach is far and wide – it has, after all, been around since 1940.

Guests from all over the state attended last Wednesday's seminar, presenting useful gardening information and answering questions.

Each year, the seminar features a different theme, according to Seminar Chairman Kathryn Litton, who has been a member of the Blairsville Garden Club for 36 years.

Litton started the annual program in the early 1980s, and every year the landscape seminar takes a different focus.

This year, the event focused on native plants,

with a theme of "Here Come the Natives," drawing on the rich Native American history of the North Georgia Mountains, as well as the deep reserve of native plants that thrive in the area.

"Our goal is to promote conservation, beautification and education," said Litton. "The garden club does different projects during the year to beautify the community and to educate people.

"Our main focus for the seminar is to educate people how to have better gardens, grow better flowers and shrubs and plants that will work in our area. We have our own miniclimate in the mountains that's different from anything else." Blairsville Garden Club
