Fourth of July festivities promise fun and fireworks

On July 4, 1776, the Founding Fathers of the United States of America put forth a document that forever changed the way mankind viewed freedom.

Thanks to those original patriots, and to the brave men and women who have kept America free from that day forward, Americans everywhere will be celebrating the nation's 241st birthday this coming Tuesday, July 4, 2017.

Union County residents and visitors from around the region will have plenty of patriotic outing options this year, starting with the Nottely Marina Annual Fourth of July Boat Parade on Saturday,

July 1. Lake-loving independence celebrants are encouraged to decorate their jet skis, pontoons, canoes, kayaks and any other kinds of boats for the parade. Past decorative themes have been patriotic and otherwise, ranging from Frozen to pirates to Ghostbusters.

Line-up time for the Nottely Marina Fourth of July Boat Parade is at 11 a.m. this Saturday, and trophies will go out at 12:30 p.m.

The event is free for spectators and those entering the parade. Nottely Marina is located three miles north of Blairsville up U.S. 129N, at 86 Doucette Circle.

Independence Day is on a Tuesday this year, and even though it's a weekday, there's still tons to be done to celebrate the holiday.

Vogel State Park kicks off its Fourth of July Celebration with an 8:30 a.m. flag raising ceremony, and will have various family activities and games throughout the day. Parking at Vogel is \$5.

As for fireworks, quite possibly the biggest annual show in the area will be the annual Independence Day Fireworks at Meeks Park.

The Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce, in conjunction with fireworks sponsor WoodmenLife, will be hosting its biggest ever show, with more bangs and a longer runtime than in previous years.

As usual, the chamber is holding a \$10 raffle to win \$1,000, the proceeds of which will go toward the cost of the

Sheriff's Office nabs 37 in massive drug bust

The Union County Sheriff's Office has recorded the biggest methamphetamine bust in terms of number of arrests in the history of the department.

The bust was generated through Operation Ghost, a nine-month narcotics investigation, and netted 37 arrests including the persons responsible for bringing the drug into the county, Union County Sheriff Mack Mason said.

At least eight people have been charged with RICO or Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act, Union County Jail records show.

"It was quite a lick," Sheriff Mason said. "And we hope we're sending the right message to drug dealers - stay out of Union County."

Operation Ghost got started on a tip from a

neighboring county sheriff's office. From day one, the investigation grew and grew, culminating in 37 arrests last Thursday, Sheriff Mason said.

"It was a total team effort," the sheriff said. "We had everyone in the

department working this one, from our office personnel to folks in the jail, patrol, CID, Warrants, Blairsville Police Department and State Probation Services."

"Based on the tip we received, we started gathering information and went with it from there," Union County Sheriff's Sgt. Tyler Miller said. "We worked controlled buys and built our case from top to bottom."

The sting operation netted two vehicle seizures, \$16,000 in cash, and more than 200 grams of methamphetamine valued at more than \$20,000 on the street, a substantial amount of marijuana, three firearms, and one stolen firearm, said
