Total Solar Eclipse brings thousands to Union County, area

Eclipse mania swept through the region on Monday, Aug. 21, bringing thousands of visitors to town to catch sight of the once-in-a-lifetime spectacle known as a total solar eclipse.

The day sky steadily darkened between the start of the eclipse at 1 p.m. and totality around 2:35 p.m. on Monday, causing a truly unique light to inhabit the county for a brief time.

And as the moon finally blocked out all but the outermost layer of the sun's atmosphere, eclipse watchers removed their protective eyewear to enjoy the full experience of a total solar eclipse for all of two minutes before the sun came peeking back out around the far side of the moon in the midst of an increasingly cloudy sky. So, was the Great

American Eclipse worth it? The turnout would suggest that, yes, viewing

totality was totally worth it. Residents and visitors alike showed extreme interest in the Aug. 21 natural phenomenon, as regional roadways filled with thousands more vehicles than is usual for a Monday.

However, several accidents were reported as visitors began to head home. Fire Chief/EMA Director David Dyer said none of those accidents were life-threatening crashes.

Meanwhile, some preeclipse figures placed tens of thousands of eclipse chasers squarely in Union County and the surrounding areas on eclipse day, those numbers may have been overestimated.

Traffic over the eclipse weekend was significantly lighter than expected, and though the county experienced the equivalent of a busy weekend, it wasn't as bad as many had anticipated. In fact, most locals stayed home rather than risk getting stranded in heavy traffic.

Union County roads, and particularly Georgia 515, were largely quiet until about an hour before the start of the eclipse, when traffic picked up markedly coming from Fannin and Gilmer counties. Temporary signage along the State Route directed visitors to various businesses and parks.

Overall, the designated eclipse-viewing areas were busy on Monday, though thru-traffic underwhelmed – thankfully, some would say – expectations, and traffic picked up after the eclipse as people made their way home

through the county. As far as folks watching the eclipse, businesses all over town held viewing parties, and the Blairsville-Union County Chamber of Commerce offered several safe venues that proved **See** *Eclipse*, *Page* **3A**

A former Union County teacher is out on bond and out of a job after being arrested for allegedly having sex with one of her middle school students in 2013.


