Veteran Chuck Honaker emceed the luncheon, introducing special guests of honor and entertaining fellow veterans and all those who attended the event.

Before lunch was served, the North Georgia Honor Guard presented the Missing Man Table and Honors Ceremony in loving memory and respect of all those who paid the ultimate sacrifice, and for those who have yet to come home to their friends and family.

"This table has been reserved to honor our missing members," said Honaker. "Set for six, the empty chairs represent Americans who were or are missing from each of the services, the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard and civilians, all with us in spirit."

Honaker explained the

meaning of the table before a moment of silence. At the conclusion of the ceremony, a glass was raised in a toast to honor America's POWs/MIAs, to the success of our efforts to account for them and to the safety of all now serving our Following the Missing

Man Ceremony and recognition of all those who have served in this great country's military, and the branches in which they served, the annual Commanders Award was presented. This year's recipient of the esteemed award was Mike Ruback.

"Every year, a veteran who is a member of one of these service organizations is picked to be a recipient of the Commanders Award," said Honaker. "This award is the highest honor that can be given to any member. The selection of the recipient is

A recreational vehicle on Jordan Lane caught fire on Friday afternoon, leading to a structure fire that heavily damaged a North Union County home, Union County Fire Chief David Dyer said.

The home is owned by Dave, Carol and Ashley Heldman, owners of G&G Bakery and Café.

Located off Rogers Road near Nottely Marina, the house fire was reported by neighbors, Chief Dyer said.

'It looks like the (RV) caught on fire and then it caught the house on fire," Chief Dyer said. "No one was home at the time. We were able to save quite a bit of the home, however, we did have a partial roof collapse.

"It caught the attic and the roof on fire. Two bedrooms, the master bedroom and bathroom had minimal damage," he said. "A day room, and one bedroom were
