The Union County Basketball teams held their final team camp of the summer last week at Union County High School and the boys squad is expecting nothing less than a state playoff berth in 2013.



Although, no one is hungrier for success than the upcoming senior class, who were in eighth grade the last time Union's boys advanced beyond the Region Tournament.



Byers agreed with Coyne and Rowe and added that preparation for the upcoming season doesn't stop with the end of camps.



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Sullivan completes storied college career in style

Thankfully that wasn't the case, but being told that really made me take this season play-by-play and I focused on enjoying the game and having fun.



ers who are playing at the college level. So it's only fitting that this week's final segment is about a player who has completed her college career.

University of West Georgia and Union County High alumni, Kaley Sullivan just finished her college career and ranks among the top six in seven West Georgia statistics.

After four years, Sullivan finished third in batting average at .321, that included a blistering .358 batting average in 2011. Her fifth place mark in slugging percentage of 451 was highlighted by a .508 sophomore season in 2010.

She completed her tenure at West Georgia in fifth place in runs scored with 90, sixth in home runs, and third in doubles.

She also finished fifth in base-hits with 201, and reaching number 200 will always be one of the most memorable moments of her storied career.

The highlight of my career would have to be hitting a double for my 200th career hit," Sullivan said. "It came against the the National Champions, Valdosta State, in the first round of the Conference tournament."

When the 2012 season was all said and done, Sullivan found herself named to the All-Region Team. When you lead your team in put-outs, at bats, and doubles, finish second in batting average and stolen bases, then third in slugging percentage, you're going to get plenty of attention from around the league.

However, for a moment, it looked as if Sullivan wouldn't get to complete her senior season.

Following a concussion that left her out of action in 2011, Sullivan severely injured her right thumb in what could have been a season-ending injury. But thanks to an amazing medical staff at West Georgia and Sullivan's toughness, she

"I learned to cherish every moment while playing. even if we were taking a beating from the NCAA Division II National Champions, because truth is, you can never get that moment back," she said.

Even more remarkable is the fact that Sullivan is an art major and and a permanently damaged right thumb would have presented a remarkable setback on both fronts. Fortunately the team's trainer was able to construct a brace that held up for the remainder of the season.
