

No offseason for UC Panther Football

The Union County Panthers are less than two months away from the start of the 2012 season but the summer break and the heat hasn't kept the Panthers and the coaching staff from looking for ways to improve their game.

With the start of official practice a month away and spring practice in the rearview mirror, the Panthers have been taking part in voluntary camps, workouts, and drills since May.

Last month, the Panthers traveled to Jefferson for a twoday passing camp.

"We threw for two days and had a good camp," said Offensive Coordinator Howard McCombs.

Two weeks ago, Tellico Plains, TN High School visited Union County for a passing camp.

"It went really well," said Coach McCombs. "We're definitely getting better."

Coach McCombs would go on to praise the number of kids that have come out for the workouts, despite not being mandatory.

"This summer as a whole has been the best summer I've seen so far, as far as the number of kids who are coming out. We're consistently getting the majority of the team out here and we're continuing to get better."

Last week, Coach Brian Allison was on vacation but most of the team still came out for three-days of workouts. Coach Justin Byers had the players in the weight room, at 8:30 a.m., before heading over to the field for passing and blocking drills until 11:30 a.m.

"We normally workout three days a week," said Coach McCombs. "We just go over some offensive and defensive practice, just to teach them and go over basic skills.

'It's been encouraging," said Coach McCombs. "We've got a lot of young kids, who are inexperienced but our numbers are up, the effort is good, and we're getting better.
