Middle School Panthers doing work Future Panther Football Camp

The Union County Middle School Panthers haven't been taking it easy over the

Coach Casey Jones' squad has remained occupied since the end of spring practice in May. The Panthers have been in the weight room, on the field, as well as in the classroom going over plays and the terminology of the offense.

During June the team worked out two days a week, then following the dead week of July 4, the Panthers ratcheted up their practices to three times a week.

"Most of the time we

come in for the first hour and lift," Coach Jones said. "Then we throw for the second hour. Basically it's what the high school does. I had them on the field, then I realized that we needed to go back to the classroom. The biggest thing was that I moved some kids around and I just needed to show them on the board where they would be and what they would be doing. Once they've seen it on the board they can process it a little better," he said.

The Panthers will travel out of town once before the start of the season, when they attend a camp at Flowery Branch on July 26, where they will participate in 7-on-7

"We mostly just try to been going over some stuff on lift (during the summer)," Jones said. "These guys work hard during the school year and we don't want to just sit around all summer and lose everything that we've gained. We're trying to just maintain what we've gained through the year."

Coach Jones and his staff also have some heavy lifting ahead of them as they try to replace nearly the entire team from 2011.

The Middle School Panthers finished 6-2 last season and were the runner-up for the league championship. In 2010, they finished with a perfect 8-0 record, but with only one starter returning in 2012, Jones is aware of how important this off season is for the Panthers.

"We've got a lot of new kids," Jones said. "Thats why we've been inside and I've month, Coach Jones has been

the chalkboard. We're having to go back and do some teaching before we go out on the field. It helps for them to see it on the board before they get out on the field and actually do it." Over the past two years,

Coach Jones has had the luxury of having plenty of experience at his disposal but that doesn't mean that he will lower the bar for his new group. 'We've been fortunate that last few years to have a

great group of kids and we've got some great players this year," Coach Jones said. "But we don't have much time. Our first game is Aug. 16.' The off season workouts

have all been voluntary but despite official practice not starting until the end of the impressed with the turnout from all three grades.

"We've consistently had 35-40 kids all summer," Coach Jones said. "That is mostly seventh and eighth graders. We have a handful of sixth graders who are too old for the 11-and-Under Recreation team."

The Panthers will kick off the season on the road before the home opener on August 23 against the defending league champion Rabun County, who handed Union its only losses in 2011.

"When we play Rabun, we'll find out where this team is at," Coach Jones said.

Coach Jones also said that Union County High School Head Football Coach Brian Allison is always right there, willing to help the Middle School and Recreation Department teams, whenever he is needed.

"We run a very vanilla package but use the same terminology as the high school," Jones said. "Our job at the Middle School is to prepare these kids for high school. Coach Allison is always helpful with whatever we need. A lot of other schools don't work hand-in-hand with their middle schools and that's what's great about Coach Allison. He will go all the way down to the youngest team and meet with the coaches. Essentially it's about getting all the coaches together and on the same page."

Union County Head Basketball Coach David Tucker's summer basketball camp season came to an end last week following a shooting camp at Union County High School.

And now Coach Tucker is getting ready for some sweeping changes ahead for the 2012-2013 basketball cam-

Union County basketball will no longer take part in the White County Tip-Off Tournament. That's because they'll be hosting their own.

The Panthers and Lady Panthers have traveled across Blood Mountain to White County for the Tip-Off Tournament since 2002.

That changes as they open the regular season on Nov. 19 and 20 at the Union County High School Tip-Off Tournament. Teams participating will be Union, Andrews NC, Hiwassee Dam NC, and Lumpkin County.

"I didn't have any trouble getting those teams to participate," Coach Tucker said.

"We usually go to White County for a Tip-Off tournament, but last year we played at 7:30 p.m. and 9 p.m.," he said. "This year, when we play here, the last game will start at 8:30 p.m. and we'll only have a 10 minute break between games."

"Last year at White, we got in at 11 p.m. both nights and that's not fair to the kids,' Coach Tucker added.

In 2010, Union County's boys became the first and only boys squad to win three Battle of the States titles (2000, 2006, 2010) and have participated in the three-day tournament 12 straight years and have 13 overall appearances.

The wheels are already in motion as Coach Tucker has more teams lined up after the 2012-13 season.

'Next year, I've got Tellico Plains locked in," Coach Tucker said. "Andrews said that they want to come because nobody ever invites them because they are so small. They are welcome to come, their size is no big deal to me.

Over the summer Coach Tucker has joined with Middle School Coach, Casey Jones, Gary Tucker, the head girls' coach at Tellico Plains High School, Shawn Yates, Tellico Plains boys' coach, Mindy Cox, a coach at Niota Elementary School, Jon Tucker, an assistant coach at Tennessee Wesleyan College, Alli Moreland, a player from Tennessee
