Research has shown that these custom fitted mouthpieces cut down on concussions and Dr. Causey began fitting the players at 8 a.m.

The process takes about 15 minutes per player, so Dr. Causey and staff, worked well into the afternoon, to fit each and every player that took advantage of this opportunity.

"Other than the helmet, a custom mouth guard is one of the most important pieces of equipment that a football player can have," Dr. Causey said. "Just a blow to the mouth can cause a concussion."

Back in January, Causey Orthodontics opened an office in Blairsville, joining his offices in Cumming and

Flowers Branch.

"I've been looking for a way to get involved in the community," Dr. Causey said. "I grew up playing sports and played basketball throughout college. I thought this would be a great opportunity to meet some people in the community and help out the athletic program."

On average, the price of a custom mouthpiece, including the time involved, is around a \$150 value for each player, however Dr. Causey and his staff, donated all of the materials and their time.

An impression is taken of each player's mouth and a

model is made, before they can fabricate the mouth guard to custom fit each player.

According to Dr. Causey, the mouthpieces he used are different than a normal mouthpiece and are more effective in preventing head injuries.

Each mouth guard will feature the Union County logo and will have the players' number on them.

"I've done this in the past so I called Coach (Brian) Allison and he set up a time where we could all get together, and my staff was very generous to donate their time," Dr. Causey said.

"I've been involved with (Dr.) Benny Erwin and started working in that office in January," he said.

Dr. Causey was quick to point out that if it wasn't for his staff, none of this would have been possible.

Robin Deaver, Beth Schakat, Bonnie Blackmer, Tiffani Wasko, Katelynn Shultz, Courtney Wheeler, Mitch Franklin, and Danielle Causey all played an integral role in fitting close to 55 mouthpieces.

"This event wasn't just me," Dr. Causey said. "I helped organize it but it takes a full staff to pull this off."

As for the future of the Flower Show, both Baumgardner and Allen say an influx of youth is a must.

"We can't stress this enough, we need more young people getting interested in gardening," Allen said. "And we'd like more local participation. This is such a great event. We know that there are a lot of talented gardeners out there that haven't even given this show a chance. It's the real deal and we'd like for them to be a part of all this."
