The voters have spoken, there is a new sheriff in town

Mack Mason predicted a changing of the guard in the Union County Sheriff's Office following the July Primary.

Almost 6,000 votes on Election Night proved he was right.

Mason, a Blairsville Republican, is now Sheriff-Elect Mason after he defeated Democratic Incumbent Scott Stephens Tuesday night. Mason collected 5,781 votes, or 52.71 percent, to Sheriff Stephens' 5,186 votes, or 47.29 per-

A total of 595 votes separated the two sheriff candidates.

"I appreciate everything everybody did for me, I appreciate my supporters and everybody that turned out to vote," Mason said. "I'm just so thankful and humbled that the voters in Union County have given me an opportunity to serve this county. I'm going to do it to the very best of my abilities."

Mason said the voters of Union County have spoken loud and clear.

"I'm very humbled with the support they have shown for me," he said. "I pledge to do my very best to give the citizens of Union County the best quality law enforcement that we can give them. I pledge to treat everybody fair and honest and be a full-time sheriff."

Stephens was humble in defeat. He thanked his supporters, his family and the people of Union County for allowing him to serve as their sheriff for 12 years. "To the Citizens of Union

County, I say thank you for the opportunity to serve you for the past 12 years as your Sheriff. I will forever appreciate all that you have done for me," Stephens said.


Tax Commissioner-Elect Lee Knight was feeling nervous Tuesday night. He shouldn't have as he won by 2,129 votes over his Democratic opponent Larry True-

Knight thanked his supporters and his family. He tipped his hat to his opponent for running a clean race. Knight claimed 59.82 percent of the vote to become Union County's next tax commissioner. "I've had a lot of help getting here," Knight said. "I appreciate all the people that have supported me. It's been one of the hardest things I've ever done. I put more effort into this than anything I have ever done

Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris breathed a sigh of relief following the last counted precinct. No, his race wasn't close, but he didn't relax until the last vote was counted at the Union County Courthouse.

Paris returned to office with a solid victory over Republican challenger Charles Rich. Actually, the race wasn't even close as Paris won the race by exactly 2,000 votes. Paris didn't lose a precinct and finished with 59.18 percent of the 86 percent voter turnout. "I am both honored and humbled by the confidence that has been placed in me to continue as your Commissioner," he said.

District 1 BOE Incumbent Gary Davenport wiped his brow after the absentee votes from the

Blairsville precinct came in Tuesday night. Davenport, a Blairsville Democrat, defeated his opponent, political newcomer and Republican Patricia Bertuna by 104 votes in a tightly contested race.

Davenport thanked his supporters, his family and everyone that voted for him. He finished with 50.49 percent of the local vote.

"Whew, it was the closest race of the night no doubt," Davenport said. "I was really surprised that there were about 11,000 people voting. It was back and forth all night. Looking at the District 3 board race, I was very fortunate. "I'd like to thank everybody that supported me and voted for me," he said.

Davenport saluted outgoing District 3 BOE member Carlton Collins for his years of service to his community. He also said he looked forward to working with a new Board of Education member,

"She'll fit like a glove, she'll work well with our board," Davenport said. "I look forward to working with Cindy and the folks that are coming back to our board."

Byers was at home washing supper dishes when she finally decided to come to the Union County Courthouse to see why her cell phone was ringing off the hook. It was good news for Byers as she defeated Democratic Incumbent District 3 BOE member Carlton Collins by a large margin – 2,028 Collins conceded the race

early on and wished Byers the

Byers thanked her many

supporters and her family for helping her survive the campaign season. "I'm truly humbled," Byers said. "I just want to do a good job. I want to do what's best for the school and for the kids. This is about our kids and it's important that they see us do things with respect, with dignity, and acting like adults. Again, it's very humbling. I'm excited." Byers tipped her hat to

Collins.

"If I couldn't win without trashing my opponent, I didn't want to win," she said. "I was blessed in this election. Carlton is a good man. If he won, the school board would still be in good hands because we have Godly people in those seats. This whole election has been humbling to me because Carlton is such a fine person."

Collins praised ers as he conceded the race. "The good people of Union County have spoken, they've chosen Cindy Byers, and I wish Ms. Byers nothing but the best," Collins said. "I want to thank the people of Union County for giving me the opportunity to serve them."

Incumbent Coroner Benny Erwin and Incumbent State House District 8 State Rep. Stephen Allison, both Republicans, both collected more than 70 percent of the local vote to return to their respec-


